

Title: Empire of the Sun Author: JG Ballard Reviewed By: Matthew in Explorers




My Review

The Power of Positivity

As a parent, it's never easy to hear your child express negative thoughts or to see her wallow in feelings like self-doubt, sadness, or anger. Unfortunately, science says it's natural for people to dwell more on negative thoughts than on positive ones, and this can be even more true for children. This negativity is usually driven by fear, doubt, or shame, which produce stress chemicals in the brain. Ultimately, a negative attitude can shape how a child sees herself and the world around her. But as parents, there's plenty we can do to help our children develop a more positive attitude about themselves and their world

7 Activities to Help your Child Develop a Positive Attitude LOVING KINDNESS MEDITATION



Engage your child in loving kindness meditation. It involves thinking of loved ones and sending them positive thoughts. The four traditional phrases are, "May you feel safe. May you feel happy. May you feel healthy. May you live with ease."

HELPING OTHERS



Your child could help others by assisting an elderly neighbor with yard work or chores, helping a friend with homework, or participating in a canned food or clothing drive. You could also make volunteering a family affair and regularly help out with a soup kitchen or other charitable organization.

RECORDING AWE MOMENTS



Encourage your child to create an Awe Journal. In the journal, they will record sights or moments from their daily lives that they find beautiful or extraordinary: a rainbow, a kind act, or even the smell of freshly baked cookies. Your child can record these moments with drawings, descriptions, poems, etc.

SETTING AND ACHIEVING GOALS



Encourage your child to set goals and visualize and plan for obstacles in advance. This is called the WOOP approach: Wish, Outcome, Obstacle, Plan. This approach makes it more likely that your child will actually achieve her goals, resulting in increased confidence and a more positive attitude.

SHARING POSITIVITY



Share positive experiences with your child. Laugh with your child, hug your child, set aside time to provide your undivided attention, and enjoy positive experiences together.

DEVELOPING NEW SKILLS AND TRYING NEW ACTIVITIES

Recognize your child's strengths and give her opportunities to develop them and experience success. if your child expresses interest in a new activity, let her try it out. You can even find new activities to try with your child in order to increase your shared positive experiences.

PRACTICING POSITIVE AFFIRMATIONS



Guide your child to come up with affirmations that are short, positive, and present tense: I am kind. I am enough. I am loving.

Instead of giving your child instructions or requiring her to say affirmations, try to use them in a playful manner.

What we've been learning in Maths





By the end of their Reception year, children should verbally count beyond 20, recognising the pattern of the counting system. Recently, our Reception children have engaged in lots of fun Maths learning opportunities.

They have been learning to count carefully. They have been reading, writing and ordering numbers to 10 and beyond.

By the end of the end of Y2, children should recognise the place value of each digit in a two digit number (tens, ones).

In Y2, children have secured their understanding of teen numbers as ten and more before moving on to larger two digit numbers. In both Y1 and Y2 children have worked with a range of concrete objects to represent amounts.





Number & Place Value



By the end of the end of Y4, children should recognise the place value of each digit in a four digit number (thousands, hundreds, tens, ones) & order & compare numbers beyond 1000.

Y3 and Y4 children have been furthering their understanding of three digit numbers by representing amounts using place value counters and dienes.

Pupils have used their increasing knowledge to compare numbers using < > and = signs.

By the end of the end of Y6, children should read, write, order and compare numbers up to 10 000 000 and determine the value of each digit.

In Y5 and Y6, children have used a range of Maths resources to represent 4 digit numbers and beyond.



Purple Mash

We have just purchased Purple Mash, which is a whole world of fun and exciting learning opportunities in one safe online space, to support our pupils with both learning in school and at home. At some point over the next week, your child will receive a password. Class teachers will also be demonstrating how to navigate the site in class time prior to setting homework.

What is Purple Mash?

Purple Mash is a comprehensive suite of online learning tools and content, designed for children aged 3 to 11 in the classroom and at home. Purple Mash supports learning through its resources, games and creative tools, tailored to the school curriculum; everything from core subjects such as maths, reading, writing and phonics, to all the other topics learnt in school. It will also support us in teaching the computing curriculum.



How you can support your child:

To begin with, it's a good idea to log in to Purple Mash with your child's login and familiarise yourself with the menu icons and key areas of the site. You can also explore our parents' area on the 2Simple website which explains the powerful learning benefits of Purple Mash beyond the classroom all in under 3 minutes, including the parent portal if your school has enabled this.
