## Lilly's Bookworm Corner



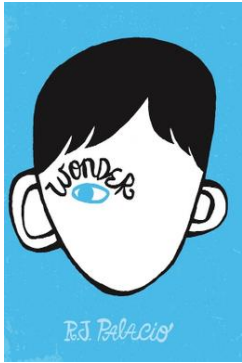
Hello all readers! This is the school bookworm here, Lilly!
